

I participated in were led by extremely passionate and qualified individuals. These activities have enabled me to make many close friends and given me unforgettable memories.








"Make a Difference" Bishop's Homily at Opening Mass

The College's Opening Mass on
Tuesday 18 February 2020 was a
wonderful way to start the year. Mass
was concelebrated by Bishop Anthony
Randazzo and Fr Jim McKeon. College
Principal, Mr John Couani and College
Captain Lachlan Mathie took the oath
of service for the year on behalf of
Staff and Students. Bishop Randazzo
delivered the homily and in part he told
the assembled students that they were
now "Disciples of Jesus" and in this
capacity, "the church and society needs
(them) to make a difference." After the

Mass Bishop Randazzo enjoyed getting to know students and staff at a morning tea at the College.

Bishop Randazzo is the fourth Bishop of Broken Bay, a diocese that covers much of Sydney's North Shore and the New South Wales Central Coast. Bishop Randazzo, who was an auxiliary bishop in the Archdiocese of Sydney, succeeded Archbishop Peter Comensoli, whose episcopacy in Broken Bay ended in July 2018 after he was appointed Archbishop of Melbourne.

Born in Sydney, Bishop Randazzo grew up in southeast Queensland and went on to study at the Pius XII Provincial Seminary and the University of Queensland. He was ordained a priest for Brisbane Archdiocese in 1991. After parish and diocesan responsibilities in Brisbane, Bishop Randazzo moved to Rome, where he gained qualifications in canon law from the Pontifical Gregorian University. He later worked for five years at the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. Upon returning to Australia, Bishop Randazzo served as rector of Holy Spirit Seminary, which trains priests for the five dioceses of Queensland, before being appointed an auxiliary bishop for Sydney in 2016. He shared with the College that he enjoyed an Edmund Rice education in Queensland and gave a strong affirmation to the Christian Brothers.

Supporting others

The many Social Justice programs on offer at the College provide valuable opportunities for students, staff and families to live out the famous saying of Blessed Edmund Rice, to "give to the poor in handfuls".

Through Founder's Day, Junior School Walkathon and Market Day, the College raised \$37,900 which was dispersed to help support our partners including Callan Services in Papua New Guinea, St Joseph's Walgett, St Mary's Bowraville, the Edmund Rice Centre, World Vision, Beyond Blue, St Gabriel's and St Edmunds. In addition to this, \$10,000 was raised for Project Compassion in Lent, as well as hamper and gift donations throughout the year. We thank everyone for their generous contributions to helping others during 2019.

Christmas Hampers

Collections by Years 7 and 9 provided much welcomed hampers and presents for the families at St Mary's Bowraville, the Burdekin Association and the Bourke - Brewarrina - Louth Parish.

The Burdekin Association runs programs to support young Australians in the foster care system, single mothers and young people who need full-time or part-time care/assistance.

St Michael's Meals in Canterbury said: "With your help we were able to

Year 10 Immersions

December saw twenty-six Year 10 students participate in the College's annual immersion program. The Central Coast Immersion saw students working at Coast Shelter preparing lunch for those living in hardship. Students saw first-hand the disadvantage brought on by unemployment as well as drug and alcohol dependency. They then spent time at the Regional Youth Support Services based at Wyoming cleaning the outdoor facilities so that the children had a safe and welcoming place to play after school. The immersion concluded with a visit to The Glen, a drug and alcohol rehabilitation centre that helps young men rid their lives of their drug dependency. They heard firsthand the stories of how drug use had destroyed lives.

National Youth Science Forum

Congratulations to Cameron Fernandopulle and John McDonald who were accepted into the NYSF Year 12 program for 2020. This 12-day residential program provides students with a broader understanding of the diverse study and career options available in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) and aims to encourage continued studies in these fields. Cameron stayed at the University of Queensland along with two hundred other Year 12 students from across Australia and leaders in scientific research and communications. Participants visited science and technology related

laboratories and facilities, went on site tours, listened to lectures, took part in workshops and participated in group activities that improved their communication and presentation skills.

Robotics First Lego League Competition

During November, ten Year 6 robotics club students attended the NSW First Lego League competition at Macquarie University. The students competed against twenty seven other teams from around the state. Challenges required programming an autonomous robot to complete a series of tasks in order to gain points. 


Twilight Concert The Perfect Aussie Christmas




2020 Drama Performance

The Ode was recited by Mrs Maria Barrett, the youngest sister of Jacob De Sisto, Jacob was a former student of St. Pius X who was killed in action in Bougainville in 1944. Zachary Forster of Year 11 played The Last Post and The Rouse.

Nathaniel joins Michael Hooper and Luke Jones as recent Rugby internationals who played the game at St Pius X.




These events cannot take place without staff good-will so we would like to personally thank all the College staff and external leaders both Old Boys and others who made this expedition a reality.

Dr Kevin Hunt

Dr Kevin Hunt, who was at St Pius X College from 1971 to 1978, is now a lecturer at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. He is also one of the top jazz musicians in Australia. His musical career started first with his family (his father played organ at Our Lady of Dolours Church) then developed through his time at the College, which he recalls as being crucial in his musical development. He pays great tribute to the "incredible" Band Master at the time, Keith Kellett. (The Keith Kellett Award for Leading Band Member in Year 12 is named after him.)

According to Kevin, Kellett had great musical sense and gave key advice to his charges: "to relax and listen when you're playing". These were pioneering days for music at the College. The backbone to this development was the coordinator, John Sparkes, supported by many others, including Brother John Mooney, a Maths teacher and violinist who was instrumental in the development of the Brass Band.

Other standout teachers, Kevin recalls, included the irrepressible

Paul Flannagan, himself a performer and a talented teacher of English. Mrs Bronwyn Hessian taught Economics to Kevin at the College and has maintained a long friendship with him as her own career led to her eventually becoming an Inspector at the Board of Studies – where she worked with Kevin's brother-in-law and fellow ex-student, Andrew Goodyear (SPX 1973).

The school had co-instruction with Mercy College in the 1970s. Kevin also recalls the "sweet" sound of young Sister Joan Doyle, who also accompanied the choir at the church.

Kevin maintains his passion for social justice through his work with the homeless and indigenous people in

the centre of Sydney through such programs as the Reconciliation Choir. Kevin shares this passion with his older brother, John, who left St Pius X in 1972 and returned as Board Chairman from 2006 to 2011.

Both John's sons attended the College. Graham (SPX 2001) is now a musician and teacher while Brendan (SPX 2004) has just become a Qantas pilot.

Their other brother Bernard (SPX 1976) conducts a very successful wholesale nursery at Taree, which was badly damaged by fires in November 2019.

Kevin Hunt is not the only ex-student at the Conservatorium. Recent graduates Phil Cullen and Oliver Osborne are currently studying there. Kevin has returned to play at the College on occasion, the place where he first experienced the magic of communicating with an audience through music. His latest CD "Hothouse: Live 2018" was launched on Monday 3 February 2020. Amongst the audience was his Economics teacher, Bronwyn Hessian, still maintaining her interest in one of her favourite students from the College.

David Bradley

David Bradley has had a long association with the College. He started in Year 5 in 1945, at what was then called Christian Brothers Chatswood (CBC) in the last year of the Second World War, when many ex-students were serving overseas. He continued until the Leaving Class of 1951 – although health reasons led the family to enrol him in boarding school at St Patrick's College in Goulburn in 1948 and 1949.

David maintained a long association with the church and the College after he graduated. He and Austin Sheath were instrumental in starting the first Old Boys Union and organised the 25th Anniversary dinner in 1952. David maintained many friendships with the class of '51 and organised their 50th reunion in 2001. Another strong connection was his long friendship with the Brothers, especially the legendary Bernard Carter, College Headmaster from 1948 to 1953. Brother Carter was instrumental in establishing the College as a senior school by ensuring there were adequate facilities for Science Laboratories.

These were first established in old ex-army huts purchased for the school just after the Second World War. In addition, David has kept a strong association with church affairs through a long membership, covering some 60 Years, of the Knights of the Southern Cross.

David became a Chartered Accountant and had a long, and successful career specialising in Insolvency until ill health forced him to retire in 1983.

David has been a great supporter of the College attending many functions, particularly ANZAC and Remembrance Day ceremonies of recent years with his close family friend of many years standing Miss Lesley Adams. David's suggestion for a commemorative site to ex-students in the defence forces indicated his deep commitment to acknowledging the contribution of the College community in time of war.

Both David and Lesley were present at the 2019 Remembrance Day Ceremony and David was able to address the students about his association with the College.
