## **COVID-19** and the **St Pius X Community**

2020 will be remembered as the COVID-19 global pandemic that changed our lives. February 2020 heralded news of this grave new virus but it wasn't until March that the College was seriously impacted. On Friday 13 March, as we were in the final hours preparing our long planned Open Day, the situation became critical. Events across the country were cancelled. We made the difficult but responsible decision to cancel the Open Day. It was the beginning of a dramatic change in the operation of the College.

Overseas tours, sporting competitions, music performances, debating, excursions, visits by guest speakers, professional development for teachers, public speaking events and our muchvalued liturgies had to be cancelled. The loss of these events placed great strain on staff, students and parents who had been looking forward to them and devoted many planning hours in anticipation.

The constant updates from the State and Federal Governments created a challenge simply in keeping the College community informed as to what was happening. It was a difficult time on many levels. People were rightly concerned about their health,



the schooling of their sons and the safety of society in general. The College worked hard to establish protocols and plans for the many possible scenarios including emergency evacuations and the isolation of suspected cases of COVID-19.

On 23 March, as the College continued with normal classes, the first major change was evident as assemblies were then conducted via the loudspeaker to students in their Home Room. There have been no more whole school assemblies since that date. It was the beginning of major changes to daily campus life. Students were constantly reminded to socially distance and be particularly diligent in maintaining hygiene. On Thursday 26 March Online



Learning began in earnest. There were a few students in attendance at the College under special supervision but all work was conducted online.

The College was fortunate in the transition to Online Learning in that a well-developed IT system via the Portal was already familiar to us. This platform was further strengthened by the use of Microsoft Teams which provided a valuable interactive medium

for classes. Online Education proved to be a rapid learning curve for students as they had to take more responsibility for managing their learning programs; and for parents having to manage the new family and learning dynamics in the home environment. Teachers also addressed the great range of student engagement in an unfamiliar environment.


By the end of Term One the online assemblies proved so successful they have now become a feature of College life. Students went on holidays aware of the possibility that Term Two would be conducted completely via Online Learning. This was not to be. As we were told, we had to be agile in our response.

The New South Wales Government announced that schools would soon be operational again in Term Two. Mid-May saw the College return to face-to-face teaching but in a changed environment. Schools were open, but with new protocols. People carried hand sanitiser to class. There were hand sanitiser stations around the College. A cough or a sneeze from any individual led to COVID-19 testing and their isolation until the results came through. Assemblies, as well as staff, Board and the P&F meetings moved online. College tours changed to virtual platforms and by the end of the term



parent teacher interviews were also online. Schooling had changed.

Term Three commenced with some sense of normality. There was a limited return to inter-school sport and debating. But not for long. On Monday 17 August the Principal was forced to make the unwelcome announcement that all inter-school sport and all further ceremonies had to be cancelled. Debating could continue via the online platform, Zoom, but the vast majority of other activities were suspended. While the premature end to inter-school sport was indeed disappointing, the College was prepared for such an unexpected turn of events and has been able to introduce alternate sporting programs and weekly training sessions as part of a new intra-school competition. Faceto-face learning has continued and where possible the College has moved quickly and seamlessly in utilising online tools to support student learning and wellbeing, and to ensure the continuation of normalcy of College life and an inclusive community.



## Reconciliation Action Plan

St Pius X College is recognised nationally for the quality of its Narragunnawali Reconciliation Action Plan. (RAP) This plan outlines the College's vision for acknowledging our First Nations People in the classroom, across the school and in the wider community.

Our RAP working team includes staff and students of the College, some of whom identify as Aboriginal. All are contributing to enhancing the inclusive nature of the College through action. Our team is well supported by Aboriginal leaders and prominent individuals with both local and/or organisational connections to culture and country. Some of the key iniatives to support the vison include: Immersions to remote communities; inclusion of Aboriginal Cultural, Spiritual and Historical perspectives; Aboriginal Education; Acknowledgements of Country at appropriate opportunities; respectful inclusion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait

Islander people at our school and associated events; celebration of Reconciliation and NAIDOC week as well as promoting conversations as Ambassadors for Reconciliation.

The 2020 College Student Diary includes the student RAP team's written acknowledgement of Country, and the EREA Aboriginal Touchstones as symbols of our commitment to Reconciliation.

# Online Messages of support to Willowood Aged Care Residents

Each week students from St Pius X College's Edmund Rice Society normally visit the Willowood Aged Care Centre in Chatswood. Despite this activity being cancelled the students created a sing along video and sent messages of support to their elderly friends at Willowood.

#### **RUOK?Day**

The College participated in R U OK? Day on Friday 13 September with an online Assembly that included guest appearances and messages of support from a good number of celebrities, including the Prime Minister, Scott Morrison. Students and staff wore jerseys and donated to R U OK? in support of positive mental health initiatives. A great day and a timely reminder to all of the need to stay positive and check in with others during these difficult times.

#### Winter Appeal

Whilst we could not participate in many of our social outreach programs the young men of St Pius X have worked tirelessly to provide donations in aid of the St Vincent de Paul Winter Appeal and the Jesuit Refugee Service. Year 9 students organised the collection of goods from homeroom classes. Warm clothing and blankets were provided for St Vincent de Paul and nonperishable food items were provided for the foodbank run by Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS). Our support of JRS was in conjunction with the parish of Our Lady of Dolours (OLD). Parishioners of OLD kindly provided the transport



of our food items to JRS, while Mr Balboa and Mr Mulheron drove our warm clothing and blankets to the Brookvale depot of St Vincent de Paul.

Many people at this time have found difficulty in meeting the basic needs required to lead a dignified life and we are thankful for all the generous donations. This work once again helps us as a community to live by the touchstones that we hold dear and that characterise us as an EREA school.

## **A Century of Service**

2020 will see the end of over 101 combined years of teaching service at the College. Three of our most respected and valued teachers are retiring after long and successful teaching careers at St Pius X College and elsewhere.

**Terry Patterson** will retire at the end of the 2020 after 43 years of teaching and service at the College. Since 1978 Mr Patterson has been well loved by students, ex-students, parents and his teaching colleagues both past and present. He is one of the College's longest serving staff members and many ex-students visit the school to see Mr Patterson. All remark on his great teaching as a storyteller, poetry reader and extraordinary teacher. His passion for teaching and the students in his care is testimony to his dedication and commitment to the teaching profession for over 40 years.

**Ross Masters** is also truly part of the DNA of the College. He was an Old Boy of the Class of 1974. His First Year of teaching service at the College was in 1979 and he has taught History, English and Religion.

Ross was for many years the Coordinator of Years 11 and 12. He was also appointed as the School Resources Coordinator. A highlight of his career was when he oversaw the school building renovations at the College's Chatswood Campus and the Oxford Falls Treacy Centre. He was a key member of the School Building Committee during this time. Outside of the classroom Ross was a dedicated Rugby Coach but also took on many other roles. He has made a wonderful contribution to education at the College, often done in collaboration with friend and long time colleague Tony Cunneen.

**Bernard Batchelor's** first year of teaching Service at the College was in 2002 when he arrived as English Coordinator. He has taught History, English and Religion. Bernard was for many years a teacher and coordinator at St Patrick's College Strathfield.

He has been the Years 11 and 12 Coordinator at St Pius X as well as the Senior Studies Coordinator. Outside of the classroom Bernard was a Rugby Coach and made a great contribution to staff morale as a member of the Staff Association Committee at the College.

#### **Facilities Update**

2020 has seen major updgrades and maintenance work at the College. Recent works include repairs to the Art Rooms, new touch screen TVs installed in all B Wing classrooms, repairs in the main gym at Chatswood, non-slip nosings on the new C Wing stairs, LED lights installed throughout the main staff room areas, Junior School, and the Administration Building. The remaining areas of D Wing as well as Art, Music and TAS and S Wing are to be done next holidays. These are all part of our College Environmental Plan.

The Sarto Centre parking area has been resurfaced and the garden surrounds have new walls.

A Wing will undergo extensive renovations during the next holidays



bringing these rooms in line with the multi-purpose, flexible, modern, bright and airy classrooms as seen in recent C Wing renovations.

#### **C Wing Success**

C Wing renovations have exceeded expectations with students and teachers enjoying the new flexible classroom designs. Results of a staff and student survey conducted during the term showed that 87% of respondents agreed the new space improved learning experiences. With a high rating of 4.3/5 staff and students indicated they enjoyed learning in the new space. The six newly renovated classrooms allow for a flexible pedagogy enabling: space where people gather to learn from a teacher, informal space where peers can share information, and private space where an individual can think and reflect on their learning.

## Sporting Accomplishments

Sadly COVID-19 forced the cancellation of all inter school sport comps GPS, CAS, ISA. And we were doing well too!

The First XI Football team won all six of their competition games and were in the semis of the Independent Schools Cup.

The First XV Rugby played well to defeat St Gregory's; St Patrick's; Redfield and St Aloysius and lost on the bell to Oakhill. The First Tennis Div 1 defeated St Patrick's and Squash came 3rd in Div 1 NSW Pennant.

## Robotics - First Lego League

Robotics Club is an optional and very popular after school STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) activity that provides opportunities including Mechatronics and Coding. These skills assist students with navigating a changing world of artificial intelligence, autonomous vehicles, drones and modern design and manufacturing techniques.

Fortunately COVID-19 has had minimal impact on this activity. Year 6 students are currently designing and building LEGO robots to compete against each other in the F.L.L. (First Lego League) Challenge. The theme this year is 'Replay'. A focus on how we as a society can convert open spaces into

play areas. The core values of all F.L.L. competitions include teamwork, cooperation and gracious professionalism.

"Teams design, build and program a LEGO® robot to complete a series of challenges. The robot has to operate on pre-programmed instructions, and complete as many tasks as possible in only 2 minutes and 30 seconds".

The skills acquired as part of our Year 6 program assist students as they move onto higher levels of planning, programing and construction techniques within the Club.

# Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award

Matthew Bradley – Year 12 has been working towards completing his Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award this year despite many of the usual activities being put on hold.

During the July school holidays he volunteered with Blaze Aid in Wauchope NSW helping farmers rebuild fences destroyed during the summer bushfires. The Residential section of the Gold Award requires spending five days and four nights away from home in an unfamiliar environment. Matthew enjoyed learning how to build barbed wire fences and working with the international back packers and other volunteers for this worthy cause.

# St Pius X College and a Thredbo connection.

Since 1983, some 1,000 Year 11 students from the College have completed the annual Snowy Mountains hike from Round Mountain to Thredbo. At the end of this 100 kilometre trek the boys are happy to relieve their aching legs and shoulders and take the Kosciusko chair lift down to Thredbo village. There is a memorial plaque at the lift to Chris Pegus who suffered a fatal accident on the mountain in 1989. Chris Pegus was a student at St Pius X College from 1970 until 1977.

The Pegus family has a strong connection to the College. Chris' brothers, Brian, John and Steven, also attended the College. John Pegus' sons, Oliver (Year 10) and Jamison (Year 8) also attend the College. The Chris Pegus Memorial Trophy for Swimming is presented in Chris' honour at the annual Year 12 Graduation. Chris was passionate about sport. He was Captain of the School Swimming Team and Vice-Captain of Barron House - constantly promoting his swimmers at school assemblies. The annual swimming trophy is a fitting memorial to his life.

Chris Pegus studied Civil Engineering at Sydney University, later working on such significant sites as the construction of the Tomago Aluminium plant in Newcastle. He loved the mountains, so it was natural he should take the opportunity to move to Thredbo as a Project Engineer for the expansion of the village. While there, he was appointed Chief Project Engineer for the 1989 World Cup.

On Wednesday the 10 May 1989, Chris lead a team from Channel 9 and Telecom to review the setup for the communication links for the television coverage of the race. Tragically, Chris fell from the platform of the Ramshead ski lift. Poor weather hampered his rescue. He died at 1:50 pm in Jindabyne Surgical Centre: a devastating loss to his family and friends. Chris was just 29 years of age. Over 500 people attended his funeral Our Lady of Dolours Church. The service was performed by family friends Fathers Tom Knoles and John Kingston. NSW Police Highway Patrol and Motorcycles escorted the funeral procession to Davidson Cemetery. Chris's mates from Thredbo conduct a memorial ski race each year on the first week in September in celebration of his life.

Local Thredbo identity Reggae (John) Elliss knows the Pegus family well. Reggae Elliss graduated from St Pius X with Steven Pegus in 1976. Reggae lives in Thredbo and MCs the Pegus trophy presentation. Reggae's brother, Glen, graduated from the College in 1980, the same year as John Pegus. Another brother Steven Elliss was also at the College and left to take up an apprenticeship after completing Year 10 in 1974. The Pegus and Elliss families were part of the strong Forestville community which centred around Our Lady of Good Counsel church and primary school.

Reggae Elliss has had a long and successful career in surf and ski reporting and publishing. He owns and runs the Rip Curl shop in Thredbo and publishes Chillfactor magazine. Reggae won the inaugural Pegus downhill himself. Young Oliver Pegus has won the Junior race in 2015 and again in 2019 in memory of his uncle. It is good to know that the connections made in school extend long after the boys have graduated. Many people from the College have worked, hiked and skied in the Snowy Mountains. It is fitting that we remember one of our own community who lost his life in a place that so many of us know and love so well.
