Commencement Mass

On Tuesday 16 February the College celebrated the beginning of its 84th year with a Commencement Mass at Oxford Falls. Our new Parish Priest, Fr David Ranson delivered a homily that has given the College great direction for the year ahead and provided the platform for the day, which was to launch, celebrate and further understand the theme for 2021, "Better Together". Fr David pointed towards the concept that as a community, we are stronger as a united group and that each one of us has a unique part to play in making St Pius X College a great school.

Eucharistic Minister Training

During November 2020, 14 young men from Year 10 took part in training so that they could take a leadership role in liturgical celebrations as a Eucharistic Ministers. This position of service is self-nominated rather than being selected by their peers. The training involved gaining a greater

understanding of the Eucharist and their personal call to holiness. Deacon Aldrin of OLD Parish led the participants in adoration, a quiet reflective form of prayer. The day concluded with the Year 10 young men being officially commissioned as Eucharistic Ministers with a Mass whereby each member of the team distributed the Eucharist for the first time.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Give to the Poor in Handfuls

St Pius X College continues to support community organisations through its Christmas Giving program. In 2020 this was particularly relevant in the face of COVID–19.

Each Year group were designated an organisation to contribute goods to. Years 5 – 7 provided gifts for the St Mary's Bowraville community.

Year 8 provided hamper items to support Catholic Care who assist families in crisis in the Manly/ Brookvale area.

Year 9 provided toiletries for the Burdekin Association, an organisation that provides assistance to young peolple experiencing family difficulties but wish to continue with their education and training.

Year 10 ensured that every employee of Centacare, an organisation that provides meaningful employment for adults with severe intellectual difficulties, received a Christmas gift at their Christmas party.

Year 11 students provided over 120 "homeless hampers" for St Michael's Meals. These hampers were then delivered to the most needy of our community throughout the streets of the inner city in the weeks leading up to Christmas.

Giving provides a strong sense of community and enables each year to live by the ideals of Blessed Edmund Rice to "Give to the poor in handfuls!"

Peer Support



CANVAS

CANVAS is an on line Learning Management System that is being phased in by the College to facilitate and support student learning. It enables the sharing of class materials and a range of other activities online. Teachers use CANVAS to communicate course materials and set work and students can upload their work in return.



By the end of 2022, all academic courses will be delivered to students using this platform.

In addition to academic courses, CANVAS can also be utilised for Wellbeing, Cocurricular and Social Justice activities within the College.

This platform also allows parents to observe their son's activities.

Enrichment Program

The College caters for the full range of student ability and actively develops and implements programs that enable each boy to fulfil his potential. The College has recently implemented an Enrichment Program which aims to recognise talented students and foster strategies to help them develop. Enrichment tasks are optional but provide extension opportunities within the current classroom environment.



FACILITIES UPDATE

Developing spaces and places to learn in the 21st century

This is an exciting time for the College community with staff and students now enjoying the extensive improvements to the College facilities that have been undertaken over the last 18 months. C Wing was extensively refurbished in early 2020 and A Wing has now also been completely refurbished.

These upgrades are part of the College's commitment to providing a holistic, innovative and liberating education for its students. It is important that the College campuses continue to develop in a manner that serves the needs of the evolving learning community; that they enable contemporary teaching and learning experiences that are relevant, authentic and creative and align with the Catholic traditions of a proud Edmund Rice school.

The next stage of the Master Plan is for B Wing to be renovated at the end of this year, bringing it in line with A and C Wing renovations.

The plans for the new College Learning Hub at 39-41 Anderson St are progressing well with provisional development approval (DA) being granted by Willoughby Council. The College is working towards having the new facility up and running in 2023.

A Wing Renovations

A Wing which comprises 10 classrooms including 3 science laboratories and two offices was completely renovated during the last summer holidays to provide light, space, air conditioning, environmental considerations and versatility. This major refurbishment reflects the latest research showing the value of dynamic, flexible spaces







in promoting positive learning experiences.

The project was completed on time and within budget. In total the cost of

approx. \$2m has been covered within the College Building Fund.

Inclusive Community

New signage

Inspired by the Student Reconciliation Action Plan Team leadership new signage has been installed around the College to acknowledge the First Nation's custodianship of the land on which the College stands.

The Assembly podium acknowledges that St Pius X College stands on Cammeraygal land as a permanent Acknowledgement of Country, and the Junior School playground features the EREA Indigenous Touchstone symbols along with the College Commitment Statement.

"We the students of St Pius X College acknowledge the Cammeraygal people as the traditional owners of the land on which we stand. We recognise the knowledge and wisdom of their leaders, past, present and emerging."

Large House banners were also installed on the B wing facade and free standing versions created to display at assemblies and events.



The Pastoral Care program at St Pius X is focused on supporting every student to thrive, flourish, learn and grow to be their best as they make their journey through the College. That sense of journey, identity and connection is supported through the Pastoral Care themes for each year group and integrated into the Camps and Retreats program. These include:

Year 7 Great Aussie Bush Camp. Theme: Belonging to a Team: "Good Soil" Lk 8 :1

Integrating a spirit of camaraderie and adventurous journey, this camp lays the bedrock for cohesion and teamwork which will carry the cohort from Year 7 to Year 12 and beyond.

Year 8 Ski Expedition. Theme: Challenge, Choice and Resilience: "Know your value" Mt 6:25 A Growth Mindset and experience in taking on the challenges of the "ski expedition" builds shared experience

expedition" builds shared experiences that are fondly remembered by generations of SPX students.

Year 9 Rites of Passage Camp. Theme: Respectful Men of Honour: "Go and do likewise" Lk 10:25

Integrating a sense of developing responsibility, the Year 9 Camps explore the imperatives of listening to the story of others, being men of action, and celebrating the sense of our shared values and principles through the EREA touchstones.

Year 10 Immersions and Red Dirt. Theme: Skills for life: "You did for me" Mt 25:40

Year 10 hone their sense of responsibility, identity and service to others through initiatives such as Community (Edmund Rice) Service Hours and Immersions. This consolidates the principle of going out to the other, to see, listen and serve rather than judge.

Year 11 Snowy Hike. Theme:

"Developing leaders": Lk 19:12 This voluntary activity is a longstanding tradition at the College. Covering 100 km's over 6 days students carry their shelter, food and clothing. This develops teamwork, resilience, interreliance and sharing of the skills necessary to overcome adversity across the group.

Year 12 Retreats: Theme: Meeting the future: "Go make a difference" The Great Commission Mt 28:16 After completing their Trial HSC examinations the Year 12 Retreat is a time for students to reflect on their formative time, growth and learning journey at St Pius X. They consider the great gifts, shared experiences and connections with family, school and friends which stand them in good stead for the great journey and exciting challenges ahead of them.



PERFORMING AND VISUAL ARTS

The dramatic threat of Climate Change

The Drama Department will work with professional writer/actor Tom Mesker (NIDA, atyp, Belvoir) to create an original production that will explore the real threat of Climate Change in 2021.

This production will be filmed at the College and will include music by SPX students, as well as art students who will help with the set design, preproduction and the look of the film. Over 30 students have expressed an interest in being involved including as actors, costume and set designers, musicians, scriptwriters, editors, film makers and production managers. Filming will take place in April with the Premiere planned for May.

thing about the position is that I get to teach about fish - I would have never thought I'd enjoy teaching, but I had an opportunity to help teach a senior-level fish ecology course when I was still an undergraduate at University of California, Berkeley and discovered that I not only had an aptitude for teaching, but that it was also more thrilling than even fisheries research. These days I'm forced to teach online because we are under a stay-at-home order, and I fear I might be doing my worst teaching ever, mainly because I don't have the *luxury of being able to interact with my* students in realtime and also I've had to drop all of the hands-on exercises and excursions that would normally be underway in my Aquaculture and Fish Physiology courses.

Dr David Greco (Class of 1999)

From St Pius X to the international music scene.

David Greco (Class of 1999) was the middle of three brothers who attended the College (the others being Anthony 1996 and Matthew 2004). David was a talented student, vocalist and actor who has gone on to great success as a performer. He sung on many occasions at the College and played the role of Birdboot in The Real Inspector Hound with great style in 1998. Graduating with an impressive TER (now known as the ATAR) of over 97, provided the opportunity for him to study in a variety of professions but he followed his passion for music and performance and went on to study at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. He does not regret his decision.

David has sung on some of the finest stages across Europe and has appeared as a principal in the world's most exciting opera festivals including Festival Aix-en Provence and Glyndebourne Festival Opera.

In 2014, he became the first Australian appointed to a position with the Sistine Chapel Choir in the Vatican, Rome.

David regularly appears as a soloist with Australia's finest ensembles and orchestras, such as the Australian Brandenburg Orchestra, Australian Chamber Orchestra and most recently with the Sydney Symphony in their Helpmann Award-winning concerts of Bach's cantata for bass, Ich habe genug. In 2017, he was a principal artist with Opera Australia, appearing in The Eighth Wonder and The Love of Three Oranges, and received critical acclaim for his appearance as Seneca in Pinchgut Opera's production of The Coronation of Poppea.

David's solo recordings include *Poems of Love & War*, and in 2019, his first recital album, presenting works by J S Bach, with the Netherlands-based Luthers Bach Ensemble on the European label Brilliant Classics.

David is an active researcher into historical performance of 19th-Century voice and recently received his doctorate in this field from the University of Melbourne. His PhD led to the first Australian recording of the



historically informed performance of Schubert's songs cycles *Winterreise* and *Die schöne Müllerin* on the ABC Classic label - the latter receiving an ARIA nomination for Best Classical Album in 2020.

David recalls his time at the College very fondly. In his own words it 'served him perfectly'. He appreciated the ethos and the supportive community, as well as the opportunity to appear on stage. The experience of acting in the *Hound* helped him to find his 'theatrical feet' and contributed to his movement into the field of Opera which combines both acting and musical performance. David's brother Matthew has also gone on to become a professional musician, also continuing his love of music into his career.



Alex Lewis (Class of 2013)

Alex Lewis has just been employed as an on-air reporter with Channel 7 in Brisbane. Alex arrived at the College in Year 7 in 2008 and was highly involved in College life. He particularly recalls Year 11 English and the topic 'The Beat Generation' with the works of Kerouac and Ginsberg amongst others. His main interest throughout his time here was in Music. He was a very talented violin player and played in a number of string groups including the excellent String Quartet. He also performed with the choir. His other activities were debating and one season in the Third XV Rugby where he fondly recalls the one tackle he managed to make in Bathurst. One of his most memorable events was the Snowy Mountains Hike in 2012. He loves the mountains and cross country skiing was a great interest outside the school life.

After school Alex continued, his love of the mountains by spending several months with his close friend Max Enthoven (SPX 2013) working in Kareela Restaurant in Thredbo throughout the winter. After travels overseas Alex settled into studying journalism at UTS. He also had internships at 2GB and the North Shore Times and one at Channel 7 in Sydney led to him being offered work at that broadcaster as their Social Media Producer and a Producer with Weekend Sunrise in 2016. It was hard to balance studies with work, especially when one Friday afternoon he was unexpectedly offered work as a regional reporter in Queensland with the Seven Network. It was a great opportunity but he had to be ready to go the following Monday!

Alex 'took the plunge', and went to Mackay, up in the Tropics between Cairns and Rockhampton, in crocodile country – a far cry from Sydney and the Snowy Mountains. It was a big decision forcing him to balance work with finishing his degree at the Open University. After six months he moved to the Gold Coast and then in December 2020

the Seven Network moved him to Brisbane where he reports on all manner of things including crime, councils, state politics and natural disasters.

Daniel O'Kelly (Class of 2013)

Daniel has been on quite a journey since graduating from the College in 2013. He completed a double degree: Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering/Bachelor of Commerce at The University of NSW in 2019. He won a scholarship with Transport for NSW (TfNSW) and worked across the Transport Cluster from 2015 to 2019 as a scholar and in 2020 as a graduate. His roles included working as a Mechanical Engineer, Tunnel Technology, Motorways - Roads and Maritime Services (4 years). As part of his Engineering Degree he wrote a thesis on Road Tunnel Ventilation linked to his work in Tunnel Technology on the North Connex tunnel in Sydney's north.

Daniel has also been on a fascinating Faith journey. He had been involved in his local Parish at Ryde-Gladesville, leading the music ministry for the 6pm Mass each week as well as youth ministry groups. Daniel wrote:

I'll be honest, my faith dwindled for a number of years, especially around the 3-year mark at university. I had reached a low point but this was also the point at which I experienced a profound reconversion whereby the faith and my relationship with God became personal and meaningful. It is hard to express this with words, and it's certainly not something that can be found in a textbook, but this particular experience changed everything in my life. I was eager to learn more about the Catholic faith, to deepen my relationship with God and eventually discern where God is calling me. For so long I had imagined the future might look like: graduate university, get a job, get married, buy a house, have children, etc. However, one day in my final year of university *I realised that at the end of my* degree I could do anything; and someone asked me the question well what do you think God has planned for your life? And so I asked the question and at least 20 people asked me similar questions like "Have you thought about the priesthood?"... At the same time, the Archdiocese of Sydney was setting up its first House of Discernment, called Sumner House (located in Lidcombe, NSW). It was a house for young men to live in community and discern where God is calling them in their Vocation, whether it be marriage, priesthood or religious life. I entered the House

in September 2019 and lived with eight brothers. The house provided support in terms of formation, brotherhood and fostering our identity as men of God to gain the freedom to choose the next step in responding to God's call. I applied for the Seminary in November 2020 after discerning that my best bet is that God is calling me to be a priest, still open to wherever God may lead me in the future.

I am very grateful for the education that I received at St Pius X as it has shaped who I am today and laid the foundation for my life: **Fide et Labore**. It's heartening that there are good young men graduating into the world having received such an important and fruitful formation.

Michael Rodgers, who is in the seminary with Daniel is the nephew of Mr Pat Rodgers, History Coordinator at the College.

Daniel was a fine young man at school – a real asset to the College. We wish him every success for the future.
