Year 7 Induction

An important component of the Pastoral Care program is instilling within all members of the school community a sense of connection to the College story. Year 7 spent a day in the bush at Oxford Falls to share the story of the College founder, Blessed Edmund Rice, and consider their own story as they begin their journey together and develop into our HSC Class of 2027.

Activities included an acknowledgment of Cammeraygal heritage and culture, a drum circle by middle creek to connect the group in reflective action, learning about St Pius X as a global Edmund Rice School from Br Carl Sherrin (Class of 1953), engaging in community building activities with Counsellor Mr Rick Russo, exploring and understanding the social justice outreach actions of the school to "those on the margins" and connecting with their peers in a different and relaxed setting.



Edmund Rice Hours

Students in Years 10, 11 and 12 participate in social outreach initiatives called "Eddie Rice Hours". Students volunteer to work in the community helping those in need, in many cases those who exist on the margins. This program is more than simply volunteering. It is an undertaking to emulate the work of, and bring to life, the spirituality of Blessed Edmund Rice, someone who worked with those on the margins.

Weekly visits to the Matthew Talbot Hostel re-commenced this year with a group of students volunteering to work in the homeless shelter for men. The hostel is located in Woolloomooloo. Students travel there after school to serve evening meals and clean-up afterwards.

Other volunteering opportunities include the Solidarity Program at Centacare who provide meaningful employment for adults with severe intellectual disabilities.

B Wing Refurbished

The College has been undertaking substantial investment in upgrading facilities over the past two years as part of its commitment to providing holistic, innovative and liberating educational opportunities. The original classrooms in B Wing, adjacent to Kirk Street have now been completely refurbished to align with the contemporary style of A and C Wings. The renovations include air conditioning, new doors, new windows which enhance natural lighting and partition walls which allow a more versatile use of space. This major refurbishment reflects the latest research showing the value of dynamic, flexible spaces in promoting positive learning experiences. The project was completed within budget for the start of the academic year in 2022. The total cost of the refurbishment was approximately \$1.5m of which 40% has been funded from the College Building Fund.

Podium Makeover

The podium was also extensively updated as part of the recent building works including new tiling, ceilings and non-slip stairs.

Yard Updates

The covered sports pavilion in the centre of the playground has been demolished and is being replaced with a new Plexipave acrylic latex sports surface outdoor basketball training area along with sandstone seating area and landscaped garden beds. This new open area will provide additional playground space and will be ready late March 2022. Signage has also been updated around both the Chatswood and Oxford Falls campuses as part of ongoing maintenance and updates to new learning spaces.

New Learning Hub on Anderson Street

Work is progressing well on the new 8 classroom Learning Hub on 39-41 Anderson Street despite the weather not always going to plan. At this stage and with weather permitting the hope is the new space will be ready to welcome staff and students early 2023.

MacDonald Gym – Oxford Falls

The wooden playing surface at the MacDonald Gym has been sanded and treated along with new line markings and a College crest in the centre circle.

College Old Boys The Indigenous Connection



VALE Craig Ruddy

We were greatly saddened to hear of the passing of former student Craig Ruddy (HSC Class of 1986) in late 2021 due to complications with COVID-19. Craig attended St Pius X College from Year 5 to 10 from 1979 to 1984 then went on to study design and fashion illustration, later working as a commercial art director before focusing his efforts on art. He was living in Northern NSW.

Craig grew up in Forestville near the Davidson Garigal National Park area where he spent much of his leisure time absorbing the sounds and sights of the bushland. He had health problems as a young child which excluded him from some sports, although he was a capable swimmer.

Craig's parents Caroline and John Ruddy still live in Forestville and the family have strong connections with the local community. Craig was a much-loved classmate of the St Pius X College (Class of 1986) which included Assistant Principal Sean Brannan and St Pius X Old Boys Association President Jeff Clarke. Craig's twin sister Kellianne (known as Kelli) went to Mercy (then known as CGHS) and left in Year 10 for St Pats Secretarial School and was an Australian and AIS Netballer. Their older sister Elissa went to Mercy as well, graduating in 1983, the last year of co-instruction with St Pius X. The youngest Ruddy, Brett attended St Pius X until Year 10 in 1985.

In 2004, Craig's charcoal drawing of Aboriginal actor David Gulpilil, titled Two Worlds, won the prestigious Archibald Prize taking out both the 'people' and 'judges' award. The portrait was considered one of the most influential artworks of that decade, in that it raised issues of Indigenous recognition and reconciliation. It also reflected Craig's strong ties to the Indigenous community. Craig had admired David Gulpilil from an early age. "He was the first Aboriginal person that I was exposed to when I was growing up as a boy" he said, "He amazes me at his ability to live in contrasting worlds". Craig was fascinated by David Gulpilil's incredible countenance. Craig believed that David Gulpilil managed to balance being part of the 'western world' (Film / Entertainment Industry) as well as being able to live on the land with his people.

Craig was a five-time Archibald Prize finalist, and the recognition of Australian Indigenous people and culture was a core theme that permeated the narrative of his work and exhibitions. He was awarded the People's Choice again in 2010 for a portrait of Warwick Thornton and was a finalist in 2020 with his portrait of Aboriginal writer Bruce Pascoe. Ruddy said the portrait had been conceived after reading Pascoe's ground-breaking book Dark Emu, about Indigenous agriculture, architecture, lifestyle, and culture.

Craig had previously recalled the support and encouragement he had received from his St Pius X art teacher Greg Moore and renowned artist Brother Coll MacDonald (known to everyone as Brother Mac) who spent 34 of his 60 years as a Christian Brother at the College. His advice to inspiring artists was that "true art comes from the heart, so always believe in yourself, work from your heart and trust in your intuition".

David Kerin, St Pius X 1961: Blind Indigenous student who went on to career in Physiotherapy.

David Edward Kerin was the first recorded indigenous student to have studied at St Pius X College. He was an Arrernte man born in Tennant Creek. It remains unclear as to how David was blinded but he was taken to the Darwin hospital, and then to Sydney when he lost his sight. In 1951 he became one of the first nine children to live at St Edmund's School for the Blind in Wahroonga under the care of Brother Adam cfc. Kerin became fully proficient in braille at 10 years and then tutored his fellow students. It was still a lonely time for him.

Kerin travelled from Wahroonga and studied for his Leaving Certificate at St Pius X College, Chatswood, matriculating in 1961 with the very creditable result of As in English and French, and Bs in Latin, Modern History and Physics. The Brothers were very proud of his achievement. Kerin travelled to London in 1962 to study at the Royal Institute for the Blind. Described as "big, husky, with the build of a footballer", he also travelled with two blind classmates through England, Spain and France.

Kerin began a long career at Bankstown Hospital in 1968. Rugby league provided an unlikely home for a blind man, when he became a physiotherapist to the Parramatta club. An Eels coach, Mick Alchin, remembers Kerin arriving, dressed in a smart suit, saying: "Here I am!" Alchin grumbled that he was "not short of wingers", to be told: "I'm here as a physio." The suit was to earn David the nickname "Dasher", and he was hired on the spot. He was to treat some of the big names of the league - Ray Price, Artie Beetson, Steve Ella, Peter Sterling and Mick Cronin. Alchin said that Kerin, was a wonderful sports physiotherapist, with an intuitive feel for the play on the ground, as well as looking after players off the field. He was also a great story and joke teller.

Kerin's last years were spent in semi-retirement, with people still dropping in for treatment, sometimes from hundreds of kilometres away. His knowledge of the turf was such that one of the few things his blindness might have prevented was his becoming a race broadcaster.

John Ah Kit, the Northern Territory's first indigenous government minister, who is Kerin's nephew, said: "As kids he made us proud. He had a problem he dealt with and got on with his life. He was an inspiration to us."

David Kerin died from cancer, aged 62, in 2007.

St Pius X Indigenous Recognition

The College is committed to recognising its responsibility to develop its connection to Indigenous culture. There are regular Reconciliation Days as well as Indigenous symbols as part of our school layout. In addition, it is important to recognise our own connection to Indigenous people as part of our community here. One important milestone was the College's connection to the Freedom Rides in New South Wales in 1965. A talented student who had graduated from the College in 1962 was part of the protest movement and was arrested when he broke the rules regarding segregated theatres in Moree. It was a landmark case for a young Michael Kirby who defended him. Kirby went on to high judicial office including as a Justice of the High Court of Australia from 1996 to 2009.

Another interesting connection is through a former teacher here in the 1970s, Thomas Dixon. Tom had previously been a Sacred Heart Missioner in central Australia missioning to the Arrernte people. In a famous case an Arrernte man, Stuart, was found guilty of murder and destined to be executed. Dixon, a highly proficient linguist, was fluent in the Arrernte language and interviewed Stuart, realising that the words of the so called confession could have never been used by the Aboriginal man.
